CORONERS' RECORDS

The BC Archives has:

- coroners' inquiries from 1859 to 1970
- coroners' inquests from 1859 to 1967

Inquiries are investigations conducted by single coroner and usually consist of a single form. Not all coroners' records between 1859 and 1970 have survived or are in the legal custody of the BC Archives.

Inquests are investigations in which a coroner's jury ruled on the cause of death. Inquest files often contain witness statements, transcripts, autopsy reports, and findings.

INDEXES FROM 1859 TO 1967/1970

Coroners' indexes are not restricted and can be used to locate the following details for requesting coroners' inquiry and inquest records.

- Series
- Box or microfilm number
- Whether the investigation is an inquiry or an inquest
- Inquiry or inquest number
- Date
- Name of the individual
- Location

Coroner's index 1859-1939

The *Coroner's Index 1859-1939* is available online, from the <u>Guides, Indexes, and Inventories</u> webpage. This index is ordered alphabetically by the surname of the deceased individual, as taken from the record. All fields are keyword searchable.

Coroner's indexes **1939-1967** or **1970**

For coroner's inquiries from 1939 up to and including 1970 and inquests from 1939 up to and including 1967, consult the following microfiche in the BC Archives reference room:

IF YOU CAN NOT FIND AN INDEX LISTING

 Search the BC Archives <u>Genealogy database</u> for death registrations, which may provide alternate name spellings or dates. Registrations may also indicate whether an inquiry or inquest was held.

- Consult the Colonial Correspondence (<u>GR-1372</u>) card catalogue in the BC Archives Reference Room using search terms such as the name of the individual, "inquest", "murder", "suicide," "drowning," etc.
- See <u>GR-2946</u> for five inquisitions held before Peter O'Reilly in 1864 and W.G. Cox in 1866, in Cariboo East.
- See <u>GR-0429</u> Attorney General correspondence (1872-1950) for correspondence covering inquests found in <u>GR-1327</u>

ACCESSING CORONERS' RECORDS

Coroners' inquiries less than 100 years old and coroners' inquests created in or after 1910 are subject to the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act* (BC).

Coroners' inquiries more than 100 years old and coroners' inquests before 1910

- If a microfilm reel number is provided in the Coroner's Index 1859-1939, the reel can be
 accessed within the BC Archives reference room. Using our microfilm readers, the record
 can be printed for \$0.50/page or saved to a USB for free. If you cannot visit the BC Archives
 reference room, you can request a scanned copy by email to
 access@royalbcmuseum.bc.ca, for a reproduction fee. Our retrieval staff will confirm the
 number of pages and associated fees before proceeding.
- If a box number is provided in the Coroner's Index 1859-1939, the paper record is stored offsite. Complete a call slip to request the box. It will take 24-72 hours for the box to arrive. You can make a copy of the record using a digital camera or cell phone, for free. If you cannot visit the BC Archives reference room, you can request a scanned copy by email to access@royalbcmuseum.bc.ca, for a reproduction fee. Our retrieval staff will confirm the number of pages and associated fees before proceeding.

Coroners' inquiries less than 100 years old and coroners' inquests during and after 1910

- Contact the BC Archives Privacy Office to request access to the records
 (<u>privacy@royalbcmuseum.bc.ca</u>) and include all details provided by the index. This process
 can take up to 30 days or longer.
- If access is approved, you can make a copy of the record using a digital camera or cell phone, for free. If you cannot visit the BC Archives reference room, you can request a photocopy, for a reproduction fee.

FILES NOT IN THE CUSTODY OF BC ARCHIVES

Inquests from **1968** onward and inquires from **1971** onward are only accessible through the Office of the Chief Coroner, Burnaby, BC (604) 660-7745, within BC Coroners Service.
