## SPECIES AT RISK

- Tiny Dark Saltflat Tiger Beetles that are 1.2cm long and huge basking sharks the size of a school bus have something in common – they, along with 1500 species, are being pushed to the brink because of habitat loss, pollution, climate change and intense competition with invasive species here in BC.
- The Royal BC Museum's travelling exhibition Species at Risk highlights flora and fauna from each region of BC that are at risk of extinction. Every community visited will get to learn about local plants and animals that are at risk and what they can do to help.
- Vancouver Island Marmots, Coastal Giant Salamanders, Lewis'
  Woodpeckers, White Sturgeon, Marbled Murrelets, Northern Sea Lions,
  Sockeye Salmon, Pallid Bats and Caribou are just a few of the species at
  risk discussed in the pop-up exhibition.
- The exhibition is animated by two interpreters one from the Royal BC
  Museum and the other from The Robert Bateman Centre. Tablets, powered
  by TELUS, connected to the Royal BC Museum's Learning Portal
  (<u>learning.royalbcmuseum.bc.ca/pathways/species-at-risk/</u>) allow visitors to
  read, watch, listen and look at species at risk both onsite and from home.
- Mini-Museum kits specially designed the Royal BC Museum compliment the travelling exhibition. The outreach kits include actual specimens and handson learning tools to give students the opportunity to study eight species at risk, from the Western Bumblebee to the Rocky Mountain Ridged Mussel.
- Species at Risk launched last summer, in 2015. It visited more than 3,500 British Columbians in 15 towns, at 14 cultural organizations and four schools. The travelling exhibition will return next summer for its final journey.
- Species at Risk is housed in an inventively modified trailer produced inhouse by the Royal BC Museum.
- The Royal BC Museum has a number of travelling exhibitions

communities of BC and highlight BC's stories to Canada and the world. They include:
