- 1. Produces, installs, maintains and documents all exhibit components by:
 - Reviewing drawings, photographs and reference materials to conceptualize the component required for specific fabrication project;
 - Developing concepts and methods of achieving the required fabricated components;
 - Testing and proofing the proposed concepts and methods;
 - Estimating and producing lists of materials and equipment required for the production;
 - Ordering supplies, establish and monitor inventory, and sign for goods received;
 - Producing models, moulds, casts, colour sketches and colour lay up;
 - Producing or supervising contract technicians to do the production of the final exhibit components; and
 - Documenting the process and production of exhibit components.
